- **What is an IUD?**

An intrauterine device (IUD) is a small, T-shaped device that is inserted into the uterus to prevent pregnancy.

- **Types of IUDs Available:**
- 1. **Copper IUD** Non-hormonal, can last up to 10 years.
- 2. **Hormonal IUD** Releases hormones, can last 3 to 7 years depending on the type.
- **Benefits of IUDs:**
- Highly effective in preventing pregnancy.

- Can reduce menstrual cramps and heavy bleeding (especially with hormonal $\ensuremath{\mathtt{IUDs}})\:.$
- **Who Can Get an IUD?**

- **Preparation for the Procedure:**
- Schedule an appointment during a time when you are not on your period (ideally within the first 7 days of your menstrual cycle).
- Discuss any medications you are taking or pre-existing health conditions with your healthcare provider.
- **What to Expect During the Procedure: **
- The procedure will typically take about 10-15 minutes.
- You may experience cramping or discomfort during insertion.
- A speculum will be used to examine the vagina and cervix; the IUD will then be inserted into the uterus.
- **Post-Procedure Care:**
- You may experience mild cramping or spotting for a few days after insertion.
- It's normal to check for the IUD strings after your menstrual period.
 Follow-Up:
- Schedule a follow-up appointment within 4-6 weeks after insertion to ensure proper placement.
- If you experience severe pain, heavy bleeding, or signs of infection, contact your healthcare provider immediately.
